Spending Objectives:

The Pupil Premium is additional funding provided to enhance the education of disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils. The aim is to improve achievement and progress for this group, allowing them to achieve their potential and flourish by engaging successfully with education thus enhancing social mobility.

This will be realised when Pupil Premium achievement is:

- Significantly greater than the achievement of pupil premium children nationally
- Championed by staff
- Supported by parental engagement

The ideal would be that there is no gap between the relative performance of any pupil groups.

We monitor carefully the use of Pupil Premium and its impact on narrowing the gap in performance. Progress data is analysed thoroughly and responded to where underperformance is identified. Resources and support are in place with clear targets for improvement.

Our data shows that this additional resource is having a positive impact on progress for disadvantaged pupils.

Progress 8: Pupil Premium Pupils were predicted to gain a progress 8 score of -0.5 at the start of the academic year. The outcome for pupil premium children at St. Bede's Catholic College was -0.37. This score puts the progress of pupil premium children in line with the national figure.

The national figure for overall progress of pupil premium children was -0.38.

The GCSE 2018 combined English and mathematics 4+ score for pupil premium children was 55%. The national figure for pupil premium children was 44%.

The above interventions include: Year 11 Maths & English additional lessons. In addition to the strategies listed above, pupil premium children will receive both academic and pastoral mentoring. The academic mentoring will be facilitated by teaching staff. The pastoral mentoring will include a focus in boosting 'wellness' and will be enabled by a number of sixth form students, many of whom were previously pupil premium children. Although we have more PP children in KS3 a greater proportion of the budget per child is spent at KS4 to try and secure good grades for those at this critical stage.
