MS HUGHES RETIRES AFTER 22 YEARS OF SERVICE

We say farewell to Ms Hughes, Principal, as she retires after 22 years of service to the College. Ms Hughes was appointed by Governors in September 1995 and retires as Bristol's longest serving Headteacher.

Educated at a convent school in Ireland, Ms Hughes has had a career in teaching spanning over 40 years. In 2011 she became the first Bristol National Leader in Secondary Education. She has mentored over twenty headteachers, has been a trainer for the National College for Teaching and Leadership and was instrumental in the training at St. Bede's of more than 650 teachers from 75 schools around the region. She was appointed Vice Principal at St. Gregory's in Bath before joining St. Bede's as Principal in 1995. Since then the school has gone from strength to strength, becoming one of the highest achieving and most respected schools within the city, now serving over 1,000 pupils with its own independent Areté Sixth form.



We are all extremely blessed to have had the pleasure to work with her as a colleague. The children are also blessed. Many of our former pupils have been in contact to share memories and wish her well in retirement. With the aid of social media, pupils she hasn't seen in over 30 years have been in contact all of them with a story they will never forget; everyone with fond memories.

Ms Hughes said: "I have loved teaching – I loved teaching Maths and I have loved being a head. One of the many gifts I have received this past few weeks was a quotation from St John Paul II, hand-drawn for me by our 2012 Head Boy, Zachary Rigby:

*"Let us remember the past with gratitude
Live the present with enthusiasm and
Look forward to the future with confidence"*



I hope to do this and recommend it to you also. I would also like to thank our parents and children for their kind wishes and gifts I have received.

The new College Principal, Mr Maher, will thank God regularly for inheriting such a great school, such great children and such wonderful staff, and I wish you all well for the future."

Ms Hughes, we cannot thank you enough for your inspirational leadership, care and kindness.


ENRICHMENT WEEK

HOLOCAUST VISIT

Year 9 pupils were privileged to hear the testimony of Janine Webber, a Holocaust Survivor this week. Janine was born in Lwow, Poland (now Lviv, Ukraine) in 1932. From 1939, Lwow was occupied by Russian forces, until 1941 when the German army occupied the town. Persecution of the Jews of Lwow started very quickly after the German occupation, and Janine and her family had to leave their apartment and all of their belongings and move outside the town. They were allocated one room in a house for the whole family to live in. Janine's parents dug a hole under the wardrobe, which three people could fit into. After spending time moving and hiding, Janine managed to obtain false papers. Six months after the end of the war she was still afraid to admit to being Jewish and fearful of antisemitism in Poland so she moved to Paris. In 1956, Janine came to the UK to improve her English, where she met and married her husband. They had two sons and two grandsons. Today, Janine still lives in London and regularly shares her testimony with schools.

SAFEGUARDING SPOTLIGHT

Video chat: Some young people use video chat to keep in touch with friends and family. Sites and apps such as Skype, ooVoo or Omegle let the user have live face-to-face conversations through a webcam, either with one person or a group of people.

What are the risks to young people?

- Some sites, such as Omegle, encourage users to talk to strangers, video conversations can be recorded and shared without their knowledge - causing distress or embarrassment.
- As conversations are live they can not control what the other person says or does. This may lead to your child seeing or hearing something that they find upsetting.

Video sharing: Apps such as Musical.ly and YouTube let you create and upload short videos. You can choose to lip-sync, perform dance routines, sing etc.

What are the risks to young people?

- They could receive nasty or negative comments from other users
- They won't have control over who sees it. It could end up being shared via other social networks, such as Facebook, Instagram, and Whatsapp
- They may hear explicit language or see adult content from videos other people have shared.

Video streaming: Live-streaming apps and sites let you film and broadcast videos in real time. People viewing the video can usually post comments or questions.

What are the risks to young people?

- Videos are live so you don't know what you're going to see - it could be inappropriate, sexual or violent content
- Other users may post nasty comments or inappropriate questions. If your settings aren't private, strangers can watch or talk to you
- Videos often disappear after filming but some sites keep them for longer. If it's shared, your child may lose control of their video.

Snap map lets people browse a map of photos and videos that have been shared publicly. Users who are sharing their exact location appear on the map as a cartoon avatar. While location information is shared only with people on a "friends" list, that could include anybody, including strangers such as contacts from other apps and websites visited. Snap Map could be used to build up a picture of home addresses, travel routes, schools and workplaces.

Top Tip: Enable "ghost mode" to disappear from the map;
When in photo-taking mode, pinch the screen to open your Snap Map
Tap the settings cog in the right-hand corner of the screen
Tap Ghost Mode to switch off location sharing
