REFLECTION – 4 May The English Martyrs

Next week, we celebrate the feast of the English Martyrs.

The English Martyrs are a group of Roman Catholic martyrs executed by English authorities during the Reformation, most during the reign of Elizabeth I. An act of Parliament in 1571 made it high treason to question the queen's title as head of the Church of England—thus making the practice of Roman Catholicism an essentially treasonable act—and authorized the



confiscation of the property of Roman Catholics, many of whom fled to the European continent. In the ensuing persecution, 183 English Catholics were put to death between 1577 and 1603; altogether, some 600 Catholics died in the persecutions of the 16th and 17th centuries.

Forty of these victims were canonized by Pope Paul VI in 1970 as representatives of all the martyrs, including St. Margaret Clitherow, St. Cuthbert Mayne, and St. Edmund Campion.

In 1987 Pope John Paul II beatified an additional 85 martyrs who died between 1584 and 1689 in England, Scotland, and Wales. Many were priests or members of religious orders, but 59—including seven of those canonized—were lay Catholics.

Reflection: "I am a Catholic man and a priest; in that faith I have lived and on that faith do I intend to die. If you esteem my religion treason, then I am guilty; as for the other treason, I never committed any, God is my judge." St Edmund Campion, one of the Martyrs

Prayer: Almighty God, who in our country raised up martyrs from every walk of life to vindicate the authority of Your Church in teaching and worship, grant through their intercession, we pray, that all our people may be gathered once again to celebrate the same sacraments under the one Shepherd, Jesus Christ Your Son. Amen.

UK FINAL OF SPORTS HALL ATHLETICS – NATIONAL CHAMPIONS!

A huge congratulations to year 8 student **Eseose** and year 7 students **Wirgiliusz** and **Obehi Venisa** who proudly represented Avon Schools at the UK Final of Sports Hall Athletics in Stoke.

The Avon U13 Boys team, which included Wirgiliusz delivered an outstanding performance, coming out on top against eight other regional champions. Wirgiliusz played a key role in securing the win in the 4x1 lap relay, earning the title of UK Champions, and also took home silver in the demanding 8-lap paarlauf.

In the U13 Girls events, Eseose was unstoppable, dominating both the heats and final in the 2-lap relay. Her efforts also helped lead the 4x2 lap relay team to a national title.

Obehi Venisa participated in the 4x1 lap relay delivering a great performance which saw her team come in at 4th place.

We are incredibly proud of all three athletes for their dedication, teamwork, and fantastic achievements on the national stage. Well done!

YEAR 8 STRIKING AND FIELDING: BUILDING SKILLS ON AND OFF THE FIELD

This term, Year 8 pupils have been developing their striking and fielding abilities through engaging cricket and rounders sessions. But beyond the physical skills, these lessons have also been an opportunity to explore key areas of personal development, including communication (Social Me) and decision making (Thinking Me).

In both cricket and rounders, effective communication proved vital—whether calling to a teammate when running between wickets or posts, or working together in the field to anticipate and react to the game's fast pace. Pupils were encouraged to speak clearly, listen actively, and use non-verbal signals to support one another and improve team coordination.

We also explored the importance of quick decision making. In high-pressure moments such as deciding whether to run, throw or hold the ball—

students practised thinking on their feet. These splitsecond choices mirror challenges we face in everyday life, where being able to make calm, confident decisions can have a big impact.

By combining physical activity with personal growth, Year 8 have shown fantastic progress not only in their game play, but also in their ability to work as a team, communicate under pressure, and think strategically. These are skills they will take well beyond the pitch.




ST BEDE'S DANCERS SHINE AT SOUTH WEST REGIONAL COMPETITION
