#### **REFLECTION**— St Camillus de Lellis - 14th July

St. Camillus de Lellis fought for the Venetians against the Turks then devoted himself to caring for the sick, and became director of St. Giacomo Hospital in Rome. He founded his own congregation, the Ministers of the Sick (the Camellians), dedicated to the care of the sick. He was canonised in 1746, was declared patron of the sick by Pope Leo XIII, and patron of nurses and nursing groups by Pope Pius XI.

**Prayer:** St. Camillus, even as you spent your life in service to the poor and the sick, your heart and mind were firmly centered in the words of Jesus: "Blessed are the merciful for mercy will be theirs." You saw in the many poor and sick you cared for the truth that God never



abandons his people even in their most difficult trials. This we ask through Christ, our Lord.

#### CARDIFF UNIVERSITY VISIT


On Friday 6th July, Year 12 visited Cardiff University to explore what life is like as an undergraduate.

#### HOLOCAUST VISIT

Year 9 pupils were privileged to hear the testimony of Janine Webber, a Holocaust Survivor last week.

Janine was born in Lwow, Poland (now Lviv, Ukraine) in 1932. From 1939, Lwow was occupied by Russian forces, until 1941 when the German army occupied the town. Persecution of the Jews of Lwow started very quickly after the German occupation, and Janine and her family had to leave their apartment and all of their belongings and move outside the town. They were allocated one room in a house for the whole family to live in. Janine's parents dug a hole under the



wardrobe, which three people could fit into. After spending time moving and hiding, Janine managed to obtain false papers. Six months after the end of the war she was still afraid to admit to being Jewish and fearful of antisemitism in Poland so she moved to Paris. In 1956, Janine came to the UK to improve her English, where she met and married her husband. They had two sons and two grandsons. Today, Janine still lives in London and regularly shares her testimony with schools.

### **BRISTOL CITY COUNCIL CONSULTATION**

Bristol City Council are currently inviting comment on the 20mph speed limits in Bristol to assess how well it is working in communities across the city. The purpose of this online consultation is to gather comments from residents and road users on what is working and what may need localised adjustments in order to ensure that the speed limits are working as efficiently as possible. The online consultation is live for over 10 weeks from Wednesday 20th June to Friday 31st August 2018. www.bristol.gov.uk/20mphreview

Paper copies along with information and maps are available in each local library in Bristol, and also in City Hall, for those unable to participate online.

Cllr Mhairi Threlfall, Cabinet Member for Transport and Connectivity, said:

"Evidence shows that slower speeds reduce the number and severity of collisions on our roads and the 20mph monitoring report has shown that, on average, speeds on more than 100 surveyed roads have significantly reduced since 20mph limits were introduced. We're keen to build on this research which is where the reviews come in to take on board feedback from residents. Please make sure you have your say during the consultation process."

# SAFEGUARDING SPOTLIGHT

## Top Sea safety tips:

- Visit the beach and look for yourself what the potential dangers are before going into the sea
- Supervision is the key to preventing serious accidents
- Always ask for local advice, for example from lifeguards before entering the water
- Inflatable dinghies or lilos are a well-known hazard there have been drownings as people on inflatables are blown out to sea and get into trouble. Do not use them in open water
- If you get stuck in quicksand or mud do not stand up. Lie down, spread your weight, shout for help and move slowly in a breaststroke action towards the shore
- Do not enter fast flowing water
- Be aware of underwater hazards
- Get out of the water as soon as you start to feel cold
- Always wear a life jacket when you are on the water (e.g boats and kayaks)

**Be aware of Rip Currents:** water typically flowing from the shoreline back out to sea. They are commonly formed by a build up of water on the beach caused by wave and tidal motion, but can also form where an estuary runs into the sea

## How to escape a rip current:

- Call for help
- If you have a buoyant aid (like a surfboard or inflatable), keep hold of it
- Do not swim against the current
- Swim parallel to the shore this makes sure that you are swimming out of and not back into the rip current
- Once out of the rip current, swim towards the shore, being careful to avoid being drawn back in by feeder currents

## **Tides**

In the UK, tides are relatively regular and predictable, yet despite this fact every year a number of people are caught out by rapidly rising water and end up being trapped in isolated bays. If you intend to venture across any beach or bank affected by tidal water make sure you know when the incoming tide is expected and know where all the exits are.
