MESSAGE FROM MR MAHER, PRINCIPAL

When the Prime Minister announced his road plan for the easing of some restrictions on Sunday, he also made reference to the gradual return of pupils to school. In the guidance we received on Monday it states 'This will not be a return to full timetables or pupils back in school or college full time, rather some support to supplement pupils' remote education'. It also goes on to say 'In line with implementing protective measures and reducing contacts, schools and colleges should limit the attendance of the year 10 and 12 cohort in the setting at any one time and to keep students in small groups'.

I also acknowledge that a number of parents will not wish to send their children into college at this time. Whilst we all look forward to welcoming students back as soon as possible, I and all my colleagues are looking at what we can provide to supplement the online learning to ensure the safety of every member of the community.

I hope that everyone associated with St Bede's will understand the need for caution and support what will be proposed in the weeks to come. However, I must emphasise that there is no perfect solution to the situation we all find ourselves in at the moment. The Families in Focus Bulletin here has some useful information and support for families, parents, careers and young people during Coronavirus. Look after yourselves and those around you. Stay safe! REFLECTION – 14 May – St Matthias This week we celebrate the feast of St Matthias

Saint Matthias is the disciple who, according to the biblical Acts of the Apostles, was chosen to replace Judas Iscariot after Judas betrayed Jesus.



Acts reveals that Matthias accompanied Jesus and the Apostles from the time of the Lord's Baptism to his Ascension and that, when it became time to replace Judas, the Apostles cast lots between Matthias and another candidate,

St. Joseph Barsabbas. Soon after his election, Matthias received the Holy Spirit with the other Apostles. He is not mentioned again in the New Testament.

It is generally believed that Matthias ministered in Judaea and then carried out missions to foreign places. Greek tradition states that he Christianized Cappadocia, a mountainous district now in central Turkey, later journeying to the region about the Caspian Sea, where he was martyred by crucifixion and, according to other legends, chopped apart.

Reflection: "they were capable of becoming apostles on being chosen by Him who foresees even ultimate issues. Matthias, accordingly, who was not chosen along with them, on showing himself worthy of becoming an apostle, is substituted for Judas."

Year 7


Hi Year 7,

EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS


The role of Eucharistic Minister is an important one at St Bede's, serving at the Masses that we hold throughout the year.


