MESSAGE FROM MR MAHER, PRINCIPAL

Schools Minister Nick Gibb has suggested again this week that students in secondary schools in England will no longer be required to wear face coverings in the classroom from 17th May. This decision is dependent on data continuing to fall.

Students in all year groups are working well but we all hope that this will happen to give us continued hope of a return to the normal function of schools and movement around the buildings.

Interviews for Vice Principal will be taking place next week and senior prefects will be involved in the interview process as they were for the appointment of the Principal.

As previously advised, we were fortunate to be awarded a grant of approximately £1 million as part of the government decarbonisation scheme. Work on this continues and will start on site at the end of June in order that this is completed over the summer holidays.

Could I remind parents not to park in the bus bays at the end of the day. The bus bays are to provide a safe exit for students travelling by bus which have not been able to park appropriately a number of times recently. Thank you for your cooperation on this.

REFLECTION - 1st May - St Joseph the Worker

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of St Joseph the Worker

Joseph understood the importance of work. He was a carpenter—a builder—and probably taught Jesus his trade. Through his work, Joseph honoured the Father in heaven and continued the act of creation. He lived in dignity.

To give workers a patron, the Church turned to Joseph, who had been made the Patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX in 1870 and the model for fathers of families. Joseph was named protector of workers by Pope Benedict XV, and in 1955, the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker on May 1 was proclaimed by Pius the XII.

Reflection: "He [St. Joseph] belongs to the working-class, and he bore the burdens of poverty for himself and the Holy Family, whose tender and vigilant head he was." Pope Pius XI

SAFEGUARDING SPOTLIGHT

"On site, out of sight"

Reminder



As you are aware, our college policy on mobile phones recognises the safeguarding benefits of young people having mobile phones for the journey to and from college.

The policy is "on site, out of sight", meaning students can bring mobile phones to college but they must be kept out of sight when in college – either in their bag or in their locker, switched off.

Bringing a mobile phone will be at the student's own risk and the college will not accept responsibility for damage or loss of any such item. A failure to keep mobile phones, in any area of the college including Reception, "out of sight" will result in them being confiscated. Collection of confiscated items by parents from the college reception can be arranged by appointment.

Therefore, under no circumstances should children be phoning or texting home to report any discomfort or illness. Children who are feeling unwell must report to First Aid in the college as directed by a member of college staff.
