Students are "respectful and reverent" in the Liturgy of the Word and in other prayer opportunities. Throughout, they felt students were "powerful representatives of the college".

A huge thank you to our families, parishes and feeder primary schools - we at St Bede's only build on the excellent work you have done with these children in their formative years. I am pleased we are able to continue their spiritual journey and bring them into a closer relationship with Christ.

REFLECTION – 24 November St. Andrew Dung-Lac & companions

- St. Andrew Dung was a priest and martyr of Vietnam.
- St. Andrew Dung represents the 117 martyrs of Vietnam; 97 of the martyrs were Vietnamese and 21 were foreign missionaries. They were martyred during a period of persecution between 1625 and 1886.
- St. Andrew was the born in 1795 to a poor pagan family in North Vietnam. He moved to Hanoi when he was twelve. He was educated by a Christian and after three years was baptized. He became a catechist and continued to study theology. In 1823, he was ordained a priest.

He was imprisoned under Emperor Minh Mang. His congregation made donations to free him. He changed his name to Andrew Lac to avoid persecution and changed locations. He was arrested a second time along with Father Peter Thi another Vietnamese Priest. Again his freedom was bought. They were soon arrested a third time and beheaded after being brutally tortured.

The 117 martyrs were beatified by Pope John Paul II. The memorial celebrates all the Vietnamese Martyrs of the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries.

The feast day of St. Andrew Dung and companions is celebrated on November 24.

MOCK COP26: CLIMATE CHANGE NEGOTIATIONS



On 11 November a group of nine Sixth Form students took part in an UNFCCC COP26 School Negotiation Exercise at Bristol University. The event was designed to emulate the negotiations underway in Glasgow where world leaders and global organisations are trying to agree policies and procedures to reduce global carbon emissions.

Representing two bodies, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, our students held a strong negotiating position and presented their ideas and proposals in a professional and competent manner.

The event ended with a vote from the floor on the resolutions faced by those attending COP26 in Glasgow, and a closing address from Deputy Mayor Asher Craig underlining the importance of young leaders to call for, and implement, the changes necessary to achieve the carbon emission targets necessary to protect our environment.

FILM MUSIC LECTURE

Year 12 and 13 Music A Level cohort attended an interactive lecture on film music held at Redmaid's High School lead by Dr Jonathan Godsall from Royal Holloway University earlier this week.

Throughout the afternoon, the students looked closely at the music of composers Bernard Herrman and Hans Zimmer, spotting the similarities and differences between older and more contemporary approaches to composition for film. This was a great opportunity for these students to get a sample of a university-style lecture, as well as learn more about film music in preparation for their exams. We hope that this experience has made the students looking to go to university excited about higher education.


Mrs Nicks' and Mrs Hayman's reading reviews

Mrs Hayman is journeying around the country by book




Set in Wales and written in 1967. I felt that the creepiness of the story was added to by its setting in a time that feels so long ago now. It is dated but an interesting reminder of how much the world has changed. Three teenagers find themselves replaying a lethal love triangle from Welsh myth.

Bristol, a city in turmoil after the Great Flood of 1606 set within a country in religious turmoil and beset by fear of witches. Vivid descriptions of the horror of the great wave that raced up the Bristol Channel destroying villages and lives as it went. Mrs Hayman's own book.



Mrs Nicks is continuing her read through the Bristol Teen Book Award shortlist. The winner is voted for by Bristol teenagers, so get reading and cast your vote!



I found this book, deeply moving, powerful and heart-breaking. Alex Wheatle tells the story of the 1760 uprising against British slavers in Jamaica through the eyes of 14 year old Moa, vividly with real empathy and brutal honesty. Anyone with an interest in history and human rights should borrow this book (Year 8+)

I couldn't put this book down. It grips the reader with a magical, timeless tale set in a fictional Scotland after a catastrophic event, beautifully told from the viewpoint of three protagonists. I enjoyed following Agatha and Jaime on their journey across land and sea to rescue their clan. It is the first book in the new 'Shadow Skye' series and I am looking forward to finding out what happens next in the second book (The Broken Raven). If you like adventure stories full of myth, magic and dark secrets this is the book for you.



Non-Fiction November continues, where we have pitted Science and Humanities against each other. Everyone who reads a book from these subjects and provides a fact from it receives an achievement point, and the Library has promised a cake to the department who generates most points. At the time of writing, Humanities are winning 7-5!

CYBERFIRST COMPETITION

The Year 8 CyberFirst Girls Competition is an exciting opportunity designed to help girls between the ages of 12-13 understand what a career in cyber security looks like, why it matters and where it could take them.

It's run by Cyber First and the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) – a part of GCHQ, the Government's security and intelligence service.



Year 8 girls can work with up to three other female students, forming a team that will take on various online challenges over the course of a week. Together the team can progress through the different rounds of the competition, at school or at home, earning badges and unlocking opportunities to explore the world of cyber security as they go.

Then, if their team qualifies for the next round, they'll go on to the grand final as regional or national representatives, where they'll compete against other schools for individual prizes, school equipment and to be crowned champion.
