


REFLECTION – 6 December St Nicholas

CURRICULUM CORNER

This week we focus on **PSHCE or Personal, Social, Health, Careers & Economic Education**

"Today's children and young people are growing up in an increasingly complex world and living their lives seamlessly on and offline. This presents many positive and exciting opportunities, but also challenges and risks. In this environment, children and young people need to know how to be safe and healthy, and how to manage their academic, personal and social lives in a positive way."



Students receive one PSHCE lesson per fortnight, plus an enrichment week in Term 6 and RSE days for Year 10 and Year 11. All PSHCE lessons for each year group are timetabled together so that visiting speakers / joint activities can be accommodated. Our specialist PSHCE staff plan one or two topics and teach on rotation to produce consistency. The College is affiliated with the PSHE Association, through which the latest resources and best practices are disseminated to staff by the PSHCE coordinator.

Topics covered are grouped under the headings:
Living in the Wider World, Health & Well Being, Relationships, Citizenship. Addressing Extremism and Radicalisation

The PSHCE curriculum helps to fulfil the College's safeguarding responsibility by focusing on relevant issues (e.g. bullying, consent). The teaching of PSHCE is fully consistent with the College's Catholic ethos and supports students in their living faith. Students graduate with a well-formed understanding of contemporary issues related to PSHCE, and are able to take their place as responsible members of society. In our recent inspections, our PSHCE programme was complimented. In the Ofsted report, inspectors wrote "There is a well-structured curriculum in place for personal social and health education that is complemented by the religious formation programme. As a result pupils including those in the sixth form are developing an understanding of life beyond the school. Pupils learn about healthy relationships, the rule of law and how to keep safe. Pupils appreciate the careers guidance that is woven through the curriculum."

In our Section 48 report, "The personal, social and health education programme is well designed and holistic in nature."



CAREERS INFORMATION

T Levels are an alternative to A Levels, Apprenticeships and other 16 to 19 courses. They are new courses which follow GCSEs and are equivalent to 3 A levels. These 2-year courses, which launched September 2020, have been developed in collaboration with employers and businesses so that the content meets the needs of industry and prepares students for work, further training or study.

T Levels offer students a mixture of classroom learning and 'on-the-job' experience during an industry placement of at least 315 hours (approximately 45 days).

The first T Levels started in September 2020 at selected schools and colleges in England since then more T Levels have been introduced to further schools and colleges, at present Weston College and Access Creative College offer T Levels with SGS College offering them from September 2022.

DARREN JONES MP VISIT TO A LEVEL POLITICS STUDENTS

Darren Jones, MP for Bristol North West visited Areté on Friday 26 November. Mr Jones, who grew up within yards of the college on Long Cross, spoke earnestly and fondly of his youth in Lawrence Weston.

He became interested in politics when the Labour government of Tony Blair enacted policies that improved the lives of him and his family, particularly the creation of the minimum wage.

The A Level Politics students in Years 12 and 13 prepared questions in lessons beforehand and asked them during the lengthy Q and A session. Some of the questions which really impressed the MP included 'To which model of representation do you subscribe and why: trustee; delegate; descriptive?' (**Krystal Palmer**, Year 12) and 'Do you think the current electoral system needs reforming and if so would you propose a more proportional representation model?' (**Will Finch** Year 13)

At one point the MP commented to one of the students, 'You should be a journalist for The Times!' The event was well received by all, regardless of ideological affiliations or persuasions and provided another great example of a healthy democracy in action.




SCIENCE CLUB

LIBRARY NEWS

The library is blitzing its overdue books list at the moment. You or your child may have received an email reminding to return overdue books. We thought an overview of the process might be helpful.

Is your book overdue?

If borrowers don't return or renew items before their due date they receive a series of 3 emailed reminders over a period of 4 weeks. If the items are still outstanding, parents are emailed directly and asked to either assist in returning the item, provide a good quality second hand copy or pay the standard lost/damaged book fee via SCOpay.

Will I have to pay Library Fines?

There are no library fines for overdue books.

If a borrower cannot return an item that they have borrowed or it is damaged beyond repair, there is now a standard book replacement charge of £7.00 per item. (unless the book is particularly expensive) Parents will be emailed directly about the overdue items before any fees are placed on SCOpay and are encouraged to email the library to discuss returns and the possibility of providing good second hand replacements before payments are requested.

If you have books that are currently overdue, please give the librarians an early Christmas present and return or renew them!

SPORTS LEADERS

Congratulations to the students who completed their Sports Leadership Modules this year and have received their Sport Leaders badge.



We have already accrued 262 volunteer hours so far and will continue right through until the summer supporting Primary school festivals and events, for schools in North Bristol. Once each student completes a minimum of 10 hours, alongside the modules, they will have completed the course and gain their certificate.

We currently have 37 students from years 10 and 11 doing Sports Leadership, with 29 students already completed their modules, and a further 8 students who have completed their hours too.

Sport Leadership is designed to use sport and physical activity to help young people develop and hone their leadership skills whilst helping themselves and others stay physically active.

Young people learn and demonstrate important life skills such as effective communication and organisation whilst developing their social and academic confidence.

Students plan, support, lead and evaluate sports/physical activity sessions, as well as learning about, "What makes a good leader?" and "How to effectively work in a team". As well as excellent peer to peer learning and development, skills learnt support their CV and employability.

We have had some excellent feedback from our local schools, "*Thanks so much for the athletics this evening. They loved it, the leaders were fantastic and some of our most inactive and SEN pupils in Year 5/6 have now said they think they want to become athletes!*" (Blaise Primary) as well as , "*We had an absolutely brilliant time. SAFEGUARDING SPOTLIGHT

Keep children safe online this Christmas - Top tips

Over the Christmas period, families are being encouraged to discuss staying safe online. Mobile phones, tablets and laptops can open up a world of exploration, learning and fun and children should be encouraged to make the most of the benefits. But there are also risks and dangers to being online, and by working together parents and children can learn to safely navigate the internet and social media.

Advice about the best way to keep children safe is available from a range of websites, and the UK Council for Child Internet Safety has published a useful guide for parents and carers whose children are using social media.

Among the top tips are:

- Explain how children can use privacy settings to make sure only approved friends can see posts and images, and warn them about sharing personal information
- Check if any of the mobile apps they use have location services enabled, and disable this if they do not want to be tracked
- Show them how to report offensive comments or block people who upset them
- Check 'tagging' settings so that when others are posting or sharing photos online, your child's identity is not revealed
- Encourage your child to come and talk to you if they see anything that upsets them
- Ask them to show you which social media apps they use, what they like about them and talk about how to use them safely
