MESSAGE FROM MR KING, PRINCIPAL

I hope you all had a restful half-term. The students and staff have returned in good spirits and the college atmosphere is positive and warm, and we are all intent on making this term another p success.

This week marked the beginning of Lent, one of my favourite times of year. The Ash Wednesday services helped the students and staff focus on the period ahead and how we might prepare for the upcoming Easter season. We were all asked to consider new opportunities to pray, give something up and offer time or money to others. I encourage everyone in the St Bede's community to commit to these things with us over the next 40 days, though if you are like me you will need to concentrate on each day as it comes.

The dreadful conflict in Ukraine has further focused our attention on today and trying to worry less about tomorrow. As Matthew's Gospel reminds us: "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" We have prayed daily for the people of Ukraine and hope for peace and reconciliation in the near future.

Please reinforce this message at home and remind children that mobile phones are permitted on-site but must be out of sight.

REFLECTION—7th March Ss Perpetua & Felicity

Both St. Perpetua and St. Felicity were martyred during a time of great persecution. They were put to death in the year 202 in the games which made public spectacles of those who refused to renounce their faith.



St. Perpetua was a well-educated noblewoman living in North Africa. Her mother was a Christian but her father was a pagan. Perpetua was 22 when she was arrested and imprisoned. She kept a diary of her sufferings and the nature of the torture she endured. She continued to care for her child in spite of the torture she was forced to endure.

St. Felicity was a pregnant slave girl who was imprisoned at the same time as Perpetua. She also was tortured and condemned to die. Several days before the games began she gave birth to a baby girl. The baby girl was secretly taken away to be raised by Christians.

Reflection: "When my father in his affection for me was trying to turn me from my purpose by arguments and thus weaken my faith, I said to him, 'Do you see this vessel—water pot or whatever it may be? Can it be called by any other name than what it is?' 'No,' he replied. 'So also I cannot call myself by any other name than what I am—a Christian.'" **St Perpetua**

Lord God, grant that I may love and serve You as faithfully as Your martyrs Saints Perpetua and Felicity, so that I may someday join them to praise You in Heaven.

Pray that I may also choose to be as steadfast in my own faith against the influences of the world as they were, no matter what it may cost me. Amen

CASHLESS CATERING

We are pleased to announce that in July 2022 we will be introducing Cashless Catering. The benefits of the system will be to avoid the use of cash, maintain anonymity to Free School Meals students and to reduce queue times.

The launch will begin with current years 7-10 and year 12 being signed up to Biometric Fingerprint recognition or Personal Identification numbers.

Next step:

- We shall write to all parents and carers to request consent to proceed before Easter 2022.
- It will then be possible for SCOPAY accounts to be set up to a daily spend for children and families will be able to view what has been purchased. There will be an option to top-up with cash if necessary.
- In addition to the cashless system, we are planning in October to enhance the lunchtime service with the launch of an App that will enable students to order and collect cold food at break time and to order in advance of lunchtime. The App will be trialled with years 12 and 13 in September 2022.

We have envisaged that the planned developments will enhance the expression for students and will keep families informed of the process.

MESSAGE FOR YEAR 7 PARENTS AND CARERS

Year 7 parents and carers,

We have noticed an increasing number of problems coming into college that have stemmed from the students interactions with each other over the social media apps they are using on their mobile devices at home.

Some of the content being shared and the language being used about and towards each other is upsetting and is affecting the well-being of the children. We would urge you to sit down with your child and talk about appropriate use of their mobile devices if they have them and perhaps discuss the messages they are sending and receiving to make sure that you are happy with what is being shared and posted.

Another great tip to keep children safe when using their mobile device is to make sure it is turned off and kept out of their bedrooms before bed and over night.

We are currently raising money for Lepra by trying to walk the length of India, this might be a great opportunity for the mobiles to be put to one side and get out of the house for a nice long walk this weekend! Students can let their tutor know how far they get!


Cover Supervisor

SAFEGUARDING SPOTLIGHT Adult Control for online activity – NSPCC advice

Research recently published by the UK Safer Internet Centre* highlighted that 78 percent of 8-17-year-olds have received a friend request from someone they don't know, and 68 per cent have experienced offensive or mean comments from other players and social media users.

Setting up controls and individual safety settings on a child's favourite app or game, is one of the ways that parents and carers can help to keep children safe and stop unwanted contact from people they don't know.
