What is Holy Week?

Holy Week recounts the final days of Jesus' life including his death, burial, and resurrection.

What is Palm Sunday?

Holy Week begins with Palm

Sunday – a celebration of Jesus fulfilling the prophecy from Zechariah with his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We celebrate Christ as king on Palm Sunday.

HOLY WEEK

What is Maundy Thursday?

Maundy Thursday honours the Last Supper, when Jesus established the Lord's Supper and also washed the feet of his disciples as a symbol of him being a servant to all. It is also the beginning of the Triduum.

What is Good Friday?

Good Friday is marked by sombre reflections on the death of Christ. When we meditate on what Jesus did for us, we are reminded of Jesus' suffering and how powerful our sin is. Jesus took on our sin and experienced the ultimate separation from God so that we will never have to experience that.

What is Easter Sunday?

Holy Week leads up to the celebration of Jesus' triumph over death on Easter Sunday. The Resurrection gives us hope that one day we will also have eternal life with God!

Reflection: "Holy Week is a privileged time when we are called to draw near to Jesus: friendship with him is shown in times of difficulty." ~ Pope Francis

Prayer: Give me grace and mercy as I try and fail, guidance when I'm not sure which way to go, and wisdom to trust you in all things. For your love brings light and life to all who seek it. May I seek you evermore as I walk with you through this Holy Week and beyond. Amen.

St Bede's Way Spotlight: Work hard, Be kind and Do the right thing



CASHLESS CATERING

As you will be aware, we will be implementing Cashless Catering from 1 July 2022. In preparation for this, an email was sent to all parents/carers of Year 7-10 and Year 12 students, on 31 March 2022, asking for permission to collect student biometric fingerprints. If you didn't receive this letter, please contact Mrs Cheshire on m.cheshire@stbcc.org. We will start to collect fingerprints after Easter of those students we have authorisation for.

Further information will be sent out in due course about how to put money on your children's cashless accounts, how to look at their eating habits, what to do if you need limits set on daily expenditure etc. We will also be issuing an App, that will enable students to see their balances, and in the new academic year enable early ordering of cold food for collection at break time.

FREE ACTIVITIES DURING EASTER BREAK

Your Holiday Hub returns to offer families free, fun activities over the Easter break The Your Holiday Hub (YHH) programme returns this spring to offer families another school holiday programme of fun activities.

YHH is a free, school holiday programme for school-age young people who receive benefits-related free school meals (FSM). Sessions include a variety of fun activities, including sports, music, arts and crafts, and other great opportunities to learn and develop skills like making friends and trying new activities.

In Bristol, 49 organisations and providers have received funding to host over 400 four-hour inclusive sessions across the city, from the 11–22 April. Every activity includes a healthy and nutritious meal. Encouraging children and young people to learn more about healthy eating is also part of the programme.

Eligible young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) or an education, health and care plan are welcome at YHH, please contact the organisation or session you would like to attend to discuss your child's individual needs. THE EDIT—A DIGITAL STORYTELLING CHALLENGE

Our Year 9 ICT students are presently planning and creating video news reports on Climate Change issues using resources provided by Adobe and Sky as part of "The Edit" project. The



National Schools Partnership has described The Edit as "an outstanding, student-led project that actively engages young people in real-world topics and gives them skills for the future".

On the morning of Monday 28 March, thirty Year 9 students were withdrawn from their normal timetabled lessons to allow them to begin filming, recording voice overs and editing Sky footage for their news reports. The students were selected from our pool of 150 Year 9 ICT students for the high quality of their planning. During this event, we were joined by Faye Poole, an Education Strategist from We Are Futures, the education and branding consultancy working with the Adobe-Sky partnership.

Faye arranged for the participating students and teachers to receive Sky merchandise bags and even helped out with some of the filming and allowed herself to be interviewed by some of our students. Faye was impressed with our staff and students saying that they were "all hard working, polite and a credit to themselves and the school." Faye has also persuaded Sky to give St Bede's an extended deadline to allow our students time to submit their news report for a competition co-sponsored by Sky and Adobe.

The students enjoyed the event too with Annette S saying it was "a once in a lifetime opportunity" and Amblin R stating "I loved the chance to shine". Hopefully, one of our teams will be the winning entrants for the competition and a huge "thank you" goes out to Mrs Hicks for persuading Faye to work with St Bede's, to Mrs Priest for giving up her

free time to be interviewed by our students and to Mr Britton for volunteering his time to be our inhouse camera operator.




CURRICULUM CORNER:

Computer Science & ICT

KEY STAGE 3

Year 7 & 8 pupils have been developing their physical computing skills with BBC Microbit computer. In terms 3 and 4 pupils have explored block and text-based coding. They have looked at fundamental programming constructs including variables, conditional statements and loops in a range of scenarios that use the Microbit's LEDs, speaker, compass, accelerometer and digital radio communication.



Year 9 Computer Science pupils have been working on their computational thinking skills, looking at logic gates, Boolean expressions, algorithms, file compression, abstraction and problem decomposition. Year 9 ICT pupils have focussed on storyboarding, scripting, filming and editing which neatly led into 'The Edit' digital storytelling challenge—see Mr Bogle's article in this issue for further details.

KEY STAGE 4

Year 10 Computer Science pupils have spent this term mastering their understanding of computer systems including the Von Neumann CPU architecture, the fetch-decode-execute cycle as well as the role of RAM/ROM and secondary storage devices (hard disk drives and SSDs) in modern computers.

Year 10 iMedia students have been busily completing their 'Creating Digital Graphics' evidence portfolios and are beginning to turn their attention to this summer's 'Preproduction Skill' exam.

Year 11 Computer Science pupils are nearing the end of the taught content for the GCSE; Term 5 will focus mainly on revision, exam technique and **lots** of practice!

Year 11 iMedia pupils are also nearing the end of their course with some students having already completed the qualification while many make a final effort to improve previous unit and complete their 'Creating a Digital Sound Sequence' portfolios.

KEY STAGE 5

Year 12 Computer Science pupils are currently preparing for their April exams but have spent this term exploring networks, systems architecture and operating systems.

The **Year 13** class are now putting the finishing touches on the development phase of their programming projects while Term 5 will see them focus entirely on preparation for this summer's exams.

Year 7 Coding Club

The Year 7 coding club launched at the start of Term 4 and has been a roaring success! Pupils have been experimenting with the BBC Microbits and our fleet of Bit:Bot robots to develop autonomous vehicles that can navigate mazes and avoid collisions using sonar object detection. Next term we'll look at Bluetooth and multi-axis accelerometer control.



FUTURE QUEST

Since January we have been lucky enough to invite colleagues from Future Quest and UWE into the college. Students in years 9,10 and 11 have benefitted from sessions in developing health habits, exploring their character strengths and making choices after year 11 as part of their PSHCE curriculum.

St Bede's is also one of the first colleges in Bristol to take part in a new healthcare mentoring program for students aspiring into medical careers. 30 students in year 10 have started the

program and have already discovered more about careers in medicine, paramedic science and radiography. The program will continue into year 11 helping students to make decisions about their post-16 education and work experience. We've got more sessions lined up for the summer term including the conclusion of our Rolls Royce mentoring program with year 11 pupils.



SUSTAINABILITY AND COST EFFECTIVE UNIFORM

We are currently investigating the opportunity to sell Pre-Loved uniforms in a bid to offer a sustainable and cost effective service to parents. The opportunity will be launched online and parents will be able to donate any Pre Loved uniform to the school for resale. The site will enable parents to purchase items, that pass inspection, at a greatly reduced price and will reduce the amount of wasted good quality uniforms going to landfill sites.

Please don't send any uniform yet, we will set everything up and email everyone in the new term to launch the opportunity. All donations will need to be washed, unmarked and without rips or tears to the seams or material.

We hope that parents, who need to buy extra uniform towards the end of a school year, will find this a useful option to get their children items they need for the final couple of months, whilst also helping parents who wish to engage in sustainability and recycling, in a cost effective way, the opportunity to do so.

A-LEVEL ENGLISH STUDENTS ENJOY TALK BY CARDIFF UNIVERSITY LECTURER

Last month the English Department was excited to host Dr Pons-Sanz, an English Lecturer from Cardiff University, who delivered a thoroughly engaging and informative talk on the Historical Development of English Vocabulary from Old English and Old Norse right through to Modern English. Both our English Language and English Literature A-Level students learned so much from the talk, such as: the changes in spelling systems; word borrowings from other languages (particularly French and Latin); how new words (neologisms) are continuously formed; and how their meanings change.

Did you know that the Old English form of 'Silly' originally meant happy or blessed, but in the 1700s changed to weak or feeble, and then to foolish and empty-headed? Or that 'meat' used to refer to all food, but then narrowed its meaning to what we know today? Thank you to Dr Pons-Sanz for giving us so much to think about and we look forward to her working with our students again in the future.

Street Smart?

Being street smart means knowing how to keep yourself safe when you're alone or with friends. Being street smart helps you to stay safe.

Here are some top tips

Plan ahead. Before you go out, think about how you are going to get home, e.g. Can you travel home with a friend? What time does the last bus or train leave?

Try to use well-lit, busy streets and use the route you know best. Walk down the middle of the pavement if the street is deserted

If you are at all worried, try and stay near a group of people or head to a shop or a garage

Avoid passing stationary cars with their engines running and people sitting in them

Try to keep both hands free and don't walk with your hands in your pockets

Whenever possible, walk facing oncoming traffic to avoid kerb-crawlers

Keep your mind on your surroundings – remember if you are chatting on your mobile phone or wearing earphones, you will not hear potential trouble approaching

Never accept a lift from a stranger or someone you do not know very well

Keep valuables out of sight – especially phone, wallet or purse

If you think you are being followed, trust your instincts and take action. As confidently as you can, cross the road, turning to see who is behind you. If you are still being followed, keep moving. Make for a busy area and tell people what is happening. If necessary, call the police.

Always tell a parent or carer where you are, where you are going and when you will be returning home.
