


Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

The devotion to the Sacred Heart (also known as the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, is one of the most widely practised and well-known, wherein the heart of Jesus is viewed as a symbol of "God's boundless and passionate love for mankind" taking Jesus Christ's physical heart as the representation of his divine love for humanity.

The feast is celebrated 19 days after Pentecost, therefore always on a Friday.

The popularisation of this devotion comes from a Roman Catholic nun, Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, who said she learned the devotion from Jesus during a series of apparitions to her between 1673 and 1675. During these apparitions, she heard Jesus make 12



ROME TRIP

The Year 8/9 Rome Trip was one many won't forget for a while to come. Great organisation from the teachers ensured that this would be the case. Before we continue to write about our fantastic experience, we would like to give a big thank you to all the teachers who took time out of their busy week to give us this opportunity, especially Mr McCarthy. Nothing could've happened without their hard work.

We visited many incredible landmarks in our four days in Rome, most being a once in a lifetime opportunity. Such as the Colosseum, where we were able to look around where thousands of people watched gladiator contests, executions, dramas and much more. We were also able to go down to the level of the dressing rooms and see where the gladiators would get ready. We were lucky enough to visit the Trevi Fountain twice in our time in Rome: once at night and once at day. Both times we were given an opportunity to have Italian gelato (ice cream) and to look around by ourselves. Every night we went out to different restaurants experiencing different foods, mainly Italian cuisine. This included amazing pasta, pizza and bruschetta.

We also came to various religious locations, which students have learnt about in RF lessons. The main area of Roman Catholic pilgrimage is the Vatican City, most well known for being where the Pope lives. Those who went on the trip were able to have an audience with Pope Francis, and see a trove of iconic art and architecture such as Saint Peter's Basilica (some even walked up to the top). When visiting historical and devout museums, we arrived at the Sistine Chapel, in the Apostolic Palace. This chapel is famous for its extensive collection of Renaissance art, painted by some of the most well-known artists in the world. One evening, we took part in an English-Roman mass - it was magical to say the least. We found it truly amazing to show our learning and continue growing our knowledge of our faith.

Again, we would both like to say a huge thank you on behalf of

everyone who went on the trip to all of the amazing teachers who planned and gave up their time to be there in Rome with us. We all appreciate your hard work planning the trip very much.

On Tuesday 6 June, 2 of our Year 8 students travelled to Sopra Steria's offices in Cheltenham to receive their prizes for successful entries made to Sopra Steria's Tech Talk competition.

Sopra Steria is a European-based consulting, digital services and software development company, with their headquarters in Paris and operations in several countries in Western Europe. Their offices in Cheltenham allow them to work with GCHQ, the UK's intelligence, security and cyber agency.

The National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) and Sopra Steria set up a Tech Talk competition to encourage Year 8 girls to describe the impact of technology on themselves and on our society. The judges were impressed with Maria and Mae's entries and they were awarded first and runners-up prizes of £50 and £10 Amazon gift cards respectively.



They were also invited to the prize giving ceremony at Sopra Steria's offices to meet some of their apprentices and NCSC Cyberfirst Stakeholders and to receive a tour of the cyber suite at Gloucestershire college. During the presentation, there was a live video link to an engineer in Washington from Blue Origin, the American aerospace and space exploration company founded by Jeff Bezos. Maria and Mae were both asked to read out their entries to the audience and were applauded for their deliveries.

Hopefully Maria and Mae will prove to be trailblazers for future success from St Bede's participants!

and Rescuing Titanic by Flora Delargy for "its overall design and the use of illustration to convey emotion in a non-fiction book."






Yoto Carnegie Award for Writing Shadowing Book Club

SAFEGUARDING SPOTLIGHT Vaping – the Dangers

Short-term effects can include:

- coughing
- headaches
- dizziness, and
- sore throats.

Long-term effects are, as yet, unknown.

Vaping and the Law

Vapes and vaping products containing nicotine, like tobacco, are age restricted. It's illegal to sell them to under 18s, and for adults to buy them on their behalf.

Top tips: How to have a conversation with your child about Vaping

Find the right moment;

When you see someone vaping, walk past a vape shop or see advertisements. Ask questions.

What do they think about vaping?

Do they know people who vape?

Why do they think people vape?

Listen to them, learn from them, but also use your knowledge to help them understand the facts and that vapes are not harmless. Talk about your expectations

Explain your concerns and tell them why you don't want them to vape or smoke and to make clear that although neither are recommended, smoking is the far greater risk.

Let them know that you care about them, explain that those who knowingly sell vapes to under 18s don't care who they sell to and they are just interested in making money.

Talk about the different reasons why children may vape, give examples such as wanting to fit in, curiosity, stress.

Talk through effective ways to respond if they ever feel pressured to try it and practise responding together.

If your child is vaping try to understand why they are vaping by asking questions like "What do you enjoy about vaping? "Or "How does vaping make you feel?".

Understanding this might help you to understand their needs and discuss other ways to meet those needs.
