REFLECTION

29 June - Feast of SS Peter and Paul

Two of the greatest saints who have ever lived are commemorated together on this Feast. Simon Peter, the acknowledged leader of Christ's disciples and impetuously inclined 'Prince of the Apostles' is joined by a man who was, in so many respects, his polar opposite: Saul of Tarsus, a fiercely observant Pharisee, scholar and one of the most creative and original theologians to



ever live, who became St Paul. We join with the Church through the ages in honouring two of the 'Apostolic men' who gave the Church its initial missionary impetus and zeal. They were both very different!

As we celebrate these two great saints, let us remind ourselves that, although very different, each had a personality which contributed much to the Church. In the same way, provided we allow God to work with us and through us, our own personality makes a vital contribution of itself, quite apart from any specific gifts with which we might be endowed. Let us celebrate the great diversity with which God endows the members of his Church as we rejoice in the examples of his great saints.

All money raised was donated to the World Wildlife Fund, to help support their important work in reducing the human impact on our natural world.

Indeed, 'Fast Fashion' has devastating consequences on our environment, responsible for 20% of all of the water pollution on the planet, so it was wonderful to see therefore, that of the 88 items of clothing that were donated by



students, 73 items went to a new home. This was a real success and we will hold more of these events in the future to make sure that we contribute to slowing down fast fashion.

STEM ENTHUSE LAUNCH

On Thursday, 15th June five students were invited to attend a STEM Enthuse Launch event with Jacobs Engineering.

"Today we had an amazing day at Jacob's engineering. First we listened to some of the crew from the HMS Oardacious team talk about their life in submarines and their daring adventure rowing across the Atlantic sea. Then we were given a challenge of our own to create a self-propelled boat to carry as many 1p pieces as possible to sail across a body of water. This challenge allowed us to work with graduate engineers who work for Jacobs engineering and speak to them about their careers.

We were all impressed with Jacobs' offices and had an amazing day; even though sadly our boat capsized"

This event was the first of many as part of a STEM Enthuse project between five secondary schools (including St. Bede's Catholic College) and Jacobs engineering.

The project will enable students to further their understanding of STEM careers alongside professional development for our science faculty. This is a fantastic opportunity and we are very grateful to Jacobs for their support over the next two years.

PSYCHOLOGY REVISION

Thirty Year 10 GCSE Psychology students attended a lunch time revision session on Tuesday 20th June. The session was run by twelve, Year 12 A Level Psychology students. The sixth form students worked with the younger students to improve their research methods skills and to help them with their exam technique in preparation for their upcoming mocks.

HEAD LICE

We have received reports of pupils needing treatment for headlice.

Head lice are tiny insects that live in the hair and are a very common problem among school children as the lice move crawl from head to head, they are not fussy and like any type of hair, washed/unwashed, long, curly or short hair.

If your child has head lice, the quickest and most cost effective method to try first is by wet combing with a special comb bought from a pharmacy or online. If live lice are found ALL family members must be treated. However, clothing, bedding and towels do not need to be washed as lice do not survive away from the hosts head. All long hair should be tied up at all times. It is not necessary to contact your GP and your child can still attend school. If you check your child's hair every 2 days and use the wet comb method they should remain free from lice.




Winner of the Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing
