REFLECTION ST EDMUND OF ABINGDON

Next week we celebrate the memorial of St Edmund of Abingdon, on November 15.

St Edmund is one of our Diocesan saints. The Newly created Pastoral Area of North Bristol is dedicated to St Edmund.

St Edmund was born in 1175. He was a merchant who became a monk.

He has links with our Diocese as he was appointed vicar of the parish of Calne, in

Wiltshire and later appointed treasurer and Canon of Salisbury Cathedral.

In 1233 he became Archbishop of Canterbury, where, he advised King Henry III for a while, but resigned in 1240 due to a dispute. He died, the same year, in France on his way to see the Pope.

Edmund's life was one of self-sacrifice and devotion to others. From boyhood he practised self-discipline; such as fasting on Saturdays on bread and water, and wearing a hair shirt. After snatching a few hours' sleep, most of the night he spent in prayer and meditation.

Reflection: "Therefore learn as if to live forever; live as if to die tomorrow." Quote from St Edmund

Prayer: Prayer of St Edmund of Abingdon Into Thy hands, O Lord, and into the hands of Thy holy angels, I commit and entrust this day my soul, my relations, my benefactors, my friends and my enemies, and all Thy people. Illuminate my heart with the grace of Thy Holy Spirit; grant that I may ever be obedient to Thy commandments; suffer me not to be separated from Thee, O Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with God the Father and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. Amen.



DARREN JONES MP

Our local MP, Darren Jones, brought his 'Speak like you own the room' oracy campaign to St. Bede's this morning talking to some of our pupils from Years 10 and 11 and Sixth Form, sharing his experience in public speaking.



Our English Department enter students in the English Speaking Union (ESU) debate competition each year, and Darren gave our students some brilliant advice on the skills

they should use and how important public speaking is in building success, not only in politics but also for campaigning, advocating for others and generally in all walks of life.

Some top tips were to: use logic; use an emotion angle; be confident; and speak slowly (if it feels too slow then it's probably right!)

THE IMPORTANCE OF ATTENDANCE

As you know, there is wide agreement among health professionals and educational professionals that school attendance is vital to the life chances of children and young people. Being in school improves health, wellbeing and socialisation throughout the life course. The greatest benefits come from children and young people attending school regularly. This is seen in our own children at St Bede's with strong correlation between academic outcomes and attendance.

The NHS has provided guidance on how to decide whether to send your child to school. It is usually appropriate for parents and carers to send their children to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This would include general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above.

IMPORTANT: Please refer to the NHS <u>'Is my child too ill for school?' guidance</u> which provides information to help families to decide whether or not a child should attend school.

SAFEGUARDING SPOTLIGHT

"ON SITE, OUT OF SIGHT"

Reminder

As you are aware, our college policy on mobile phones, recognises the safeguarding benefits of young people having mobile phones for the journey to and from college.

The policy is "on site, out of sight", meaning students can bring mobile phones to college but they must be kept out of sight when in college – either in their bag or in their locker, switched off. Bringing a mobile phone will be at the student's own risk and the college will not accept responsibility for damage or loss of any such item. A failure to keep mobile phones, in any area of the college including Reception, "out of sight" will result in them being confiscated. Collection of confiscated items by parents from the college reception can be arranged by appointment.

Therefore, under no circumstances should children be phoning or texting home to report any discomfort or illness. Children who are feeling unwell must report to First Aid in the college as directed by a member of college staff.
