
REFLECTION

This week we celebrate the feast day of St David, the patron Saint of Wales

St David was born in 500 and died on 1 March – St David's Day - in 589. He is the only native-born patron saint of the countries of Britain and Ireland. Apparently his mother, St Non, gave birth to him during a storm! St David was the greatest figure in the 6th century Welsh Age of Saints. He travelled far and wide, and founded scores of religious communities across Wales and England. St David's remains are buried in St David's Cathedral, Pembrokeshire, where he had eventually settled and established a religious community.

St David was canonised by Pope Callixtus in the 12th century.

David was a great church leader, he was a prophet and a teacher, a man of prayer and a miracle worker. He was the heart of the monastic community he founded in St David's.

AGE Restrictions

Children's books versus Young Adult books – and beyond! A guide for the bewildered

It has come to our attention that children may be gaining access to material that is not appropriate for their age group. Please take a moment to read the guidance here about how to check the content of a book first before recommending to a child.



As the world around us has got more complex, the world of young people's books has evolved to reflect the reality of life for many of our children. This is how it should be - it is very important for all young people to see themselves reflected in the books they read, and also to gain an idea of what life might be like for those around them. Books can be a safe space to explore feelings or actions before being confronted with them in real life. However, issues covered aside, some books might be more explicit than parents might expect and there is no official film rating equivalent for books to help us.

Publishers define young people's books as either Middle Grade (MG) which is aimed broadly at those aged 8-12 or Young Adult (YA). Please don't discount a Middle Grade book for your Year 7 or 8 child or even above, thinking they are aimed only at Primary School pupils. They can be great stories, well written and with real depth.

Young Adult is variously described as aimed at 12-18 or 14-18 and either of those definitions is problematic. The first one gives us a very broad age range which might cover feelings/emotions/activities we might not want to expose a 12/13 year old to, and the second ignores them completely. Publishers seem to discourage writers from aiming books at this in between market which is very annoying!

'New Adult' is a completely different age range – technically marketed at 18 plus, it can be very explicit but might present as aimed at younger people from its cover.

Here in the Library at St Bede's we have age restrictions on our books at Year 8 and Year 10 (pupils in Year 9 can ask for a parental permission slip to read in the Year 10+ collection or you can email us at librarydesk@stbcc from your email address registered with the College).

When making our decisions we start off using some online age ratings. For example, <u>https://peters.co.uk/</u> (who supply our books here at St Bede's) <u>https://www.booktrust.org.uk/</u>


Other people's opinions can vary quite dramatically so. If we are in any doubt, we read the books ourselves. This obviously isn't an option for parents so we would suggest asking the bookseller if you are purchasing from a bookshop, or you are welcome to contact us on librarydesk@stbcc.org if you feel we can help.

Please do not bring any products containing nuts into the college.





RESEARCH SHOWS CLEAR LINK BETWEEN GCSE SUCCESS AND FUTURE LIVES

Recent research from Developmental Psychology has shown that GCSE grades have an excellent track record in predicting the future lives and careers of young adults, and are even more crucial for those from disadvantaged backgrounds.

The predictive power of GCSE results outstripped those of gender or later qualifications, including university degrees, in charting the development of young people from the age of 16 into their early 20s. Alexandra Starr, a post-doctoral researcher at the University of York and one of the study's authors, said "The main message I would say is that GCSE grades are important in real life. We always talk about whether exams are only important within the education system, to climb the next rung in the educational ladder. But it's also important beyond that."

This research tells us what we have known at St Bede's for many years. Education and examination success has value for developing young people, preparing them for success as young adults and beyond.


