St Bede's Curriculum Design Principles

Within subjects: At Key Stage 3, content within the schemes of learning have been selected to comply with the National Curriculum in terms of a study of Bristish History, European and wider world non European studies and local studies; to ensure coverage of chronology, breadth and depth. The study of the Trans – Atlantic Slave Trade and the Holocaust are deemed essential and linked to citizenship. The themes of politics, society ,economics and religion are built upon over the KS3 curriculum.

The A01.AO2 & A03 skills required at GCSE level are intergrated into the KS3 curriculum. Pupils from year 7-9 will be taught and assessed on knowledge and understanding, source analysis and understanding of interpretations.

The GCSE course follows the AQA syllabus. Year 10 focuses on Understanding the Modern World, with a depth study of USA 1920-73 and a wider world study of Conflict in South

Year 11 focuses on Shaping the Nation, with a breadth study of Health and the People and a British depth study of the Normans 1066-1000.

Between subjects: the skills taught at KS3 and GCSE history are closely aligned to English and RF and citizenship
